Burn Dipping Instructions

The leader supervising the activity must read and comply with the Standard Operating Procedure, Risk Assessment and these instructions and must have completed the sign out sheet before using the activity; they must supervise the activity for its entire duration and not hand over responsibility to any other person at any time.

Description:

Burn Dipping is the collection, study and identification of waterborne fauna.

Location:

The burn dipping area is situated behind Forth Lodge; access is via the gate between Forth Lodge and the bridge before the Roman Bath.

Set up:

The duty manager will issue the equipment from the activity store; all equipment is to be returned to them at the same place at the end of the session.

Equipment provided:

Identification Charts Collection nets Plastic collection trays Magnification Jars Plastic spoons

Running the session:

- 1. Explain to the group the purpose of the activity; the collection, study and identification of various water borne fauna.
- 2. Explain to group safety considerations Refer to SOP and Risk Assessment.
- 3. Use nets provided to collect fauna from the burn.
- 4. Deposit Fauna in the trays provided.
- 5. Individual fauna can be placed in the magnifying jars for study.
- 6. Use identification charts to categorise and identify collected fauna.
- 7. At the end of the session return all collected Fauna to the burn.

Supervisors will be given copies of Standard Operating Procedures and Risk Assessments for the activity.

The safety of participants is at all times the responsibility of the supervisor.

The supervisor must:

Read and comply with the Standard operating procedure, Risk Assessment and activity instructions.

Complete the sign out sheet before using the activity

Must supervise the activity for its entire duration and not hand over responsibility to any other person at any time.

Ensure there is adequate first aid provision.

Maintain adequate group control at all times.

Ensure participants are suitably attired for the prevailing weather conditions and activity.

Be aware of any participant medical conditions that may affect the activity.

Make participants aware of conditions underfoot.

Fully brief participants on the activity, paying particular attention to risks highlighted in the Risk Assessments and Standard Operating Procedures.

Report any loss or damage to the equipment/activity.

Standard Operating Procedure - Burn Dipping - SOP

Maximum group size per supervisor of 12

The Supervisor must:

Check area for hazards, pollution and water level of Burn prior to activity.

Maintain adequate group control and have sight of all participants at all times.

Only use the designated area.

Ensure that no one drinks from the Burn.
Be present for the duration of the activity.
Ensure there is adequate first aid provision.
Ensure participants are suitably attired for the prevailing weather conditions and activity.
Be aware of any participant medical conditions that may affect the activity.
Make participants aware of conditions underfoot.
Fully brief participants on the activity, paying particular attention to risks highlighted in the Risk Assessments and Standard Operating Procedures
Report any loss or damage to the equipment/activity.

Brief participants on safe use of net poles.
