Mini Beast Hunt Instructions

The leader supervising the activity must read and comply with the Standard Operating Procedure, Risk Assessment and these instructions and must have completed the sign out sheet before using the activity; they must supervise the activity for its entire duration and not hand over responsibility to any other person at any time.

A member of the Bonaly team is available to offer guidance and answer any questions at this time.

Description: Mini beast hunt is the discovery, study and identification of various insects which are then to be returned to the wild unharmed at the end of the session.

Location: Mini Beast Hunt can take place across the site, but there is a designated area beside the Roman Bath

Set up: A member of the Bonaly team will issue the equipment; all equipment is to be returned to them at the same place at the end of the session.

Equipment provided:

Identification Charts Collection Jars Plastic collection trays Magnification Jars Plastic spoons

Running the session:

- 1) Explain to the group the purpose of the activity; to collect study and identify various insects and to return them unharmed at the end of the session.
- 2) Explain to group the safety considerations, refer to sop and risk assessment but include the following:
 - Warn participants of prickly/stinging plants and animals Ensure participants do not pick plants Ensure care is taken when participants lift logs or stones Brief participants on boundaries of the activity area, particularly out of bounds areas/danger areas such as archery range, car park and roads

 Brief participants on the dangers of running through and around wooded areas Ensure under 18's are in groups of at least 3
- 3) Be aware of any specific insect or plant allergies of participants.
- 4) Take group on a guided walk around the site.
- 5) Use pooters provided to collect fauna from the site.
- 6) Deposit Fauna in the jars or trays provided.
- 7) Individual fauna can be placed in the magnifying jars for study.
- 8) Use identification charts to categorise and identify collected fauna.
- 9) At the end of the session return all collected Fauna to the site.
- 10) Ensure participants wash hands after activity

Be aware of any participant medical conditions that may affect the activity.

Make participants aware of conditions underfoot.

Fully brief participants on the activity, paying particular attention to risks highlighted in the Risk Assessments and Standard Operating Procedures.

Report any loss or damage to the equipment/activity.
